

Now that International Arts Education Week 2021 finishes, it is time for me to step away from the WAAE Executive Forum and the role of Chair. As we decided

In handing on my roles, I take a moment to reflect on WAAE since I joined the Executive Forum in 2013. This phase has built on the WAAE Summit in Rovaniemi, Finland, in 2012, which was a significant step forward, formalising the current agreement under which the Alliance operates. In Rovaniemi, the four associations signed the current Memorandum of Agreement. (I have the original of that signed memorandum, passed to me by Patrice Baldwin; and, need to pass it on to others).

Born of necessity from the first UNESCO World Summit in Lisbon, Portugal in 2006, the WAAE has been a significant force in international arts education. I pay tribute to the founders and particularly Dan Baron Cohen for the vision he provided and his continued commitment to arts education.

I thank and acknowledge the current members of the WAAE Executive Committee: Teresa Eca, Emily Achieng Akuno and Ralph Buck (and Sanja K. Tasic). Not forgetting Rita Irwin, Margaret Barrett and Susie O'Neill who were also part of this journey. Everyone has brought to the table their focus, commitment and dedication. It was a pleasure to work with everyone (and Ralph and I first worked together in 1992 on national curriculum, so we have a long partnership in arts education).

The agreement with Jeff Poulin and Creative Generation in 2020 represents a significant consolidation of operations. It is important that we celebrate the summits that have been held, the advocacy that has been promoted and the communication shared. It is important to also acknowledge our partnership with UNESCO and continue to develop it.
